The school site and district take input from all stakeholders, needs assessments, surveys, CAASPP scores, local benchmark data, the California Dashboard, WASC process and more. We also submit a yearly accountability report to the CA Department of Education for alternative schools.

Surveys

This year we successfully completed a WASC self study so much of our needs and goals were driven by that process as well as the visiting WASC committee.

Students feel safe and cared for in CUSD alternative education programs per family surveys three times per year, informal student feedback and the CA Healthy Kids survey.

This year's showed positive feedback from families regarding PBIS, and learning supports.

20% of students experience chronic sadness/hopelessness; 20% report drug/alcohol use per CA Healthy Kids Survey (down from 29%).

100% reported being happy to be at our school.

Parents, students and staff also completed a survey providing input on library book choices as well as an end of the year alternative school of choice which was overwhelmingly positive.

Over 95% of all gave positive answers for a quality program.

Classroom Observations

The teaching team and administrator work together with frequent observations and ongoing collaboration.

This year we focused on rigor, relationships and engagement. Our staff all teach in a very open floor plan setting, allowing continuous teamwork and peer observations.

We also self-reflect on our progress using PBIS Tiered Fidelity Inventory, SWIFT FIA, and Daggett System for Effective Instruction.

All students are scheduled to participate in state testing.

Formative assessments and common rubrics used to measure student progress.

Our school uses iReady and Step Up to Writing assessments to measure student growth.

Formative and summative assessments are indicators that determine student progress. We have implemented common grade level benchmarks in reading, writing, and math that are done three times per year.

All CUSD Alt. Ed. teaching staff meet the definition of highly qualified.

CUSD Alt. Ed. teaching staff partake in CORE Days, release time during the year, weekly collaboration, and access to professional development opportunities.

The entire Alternative Education Staff is committed to increasing rigor and relevance in instruction and regular educator collaboration to assess student progress, plan instruction, and participate in professional development.

Site admin/district admin via formal, and informal observations/evaluations and post observation feedback, peer observations, and collaboration with ongoing professional development. ICLE also provides professional development in the Daggett Framework to administrator and staff.

Teachers collaborate with each other daily and with teachers from various school sites as needed. Monthly staff meetings also allow for staff professional development activities and collaboration. Our entire staff also participated in a book study together.

CUSD Alt. Ed. teaching staff are all highly qualified.

CUSD Alt. Ed. staff participate in collaboration and PD with each other and teachers from various school sites in the area of FLA and Math.

All CUSD Alt. Ed. meet instructional minute requirements.

Lesson pacing schedule (K–8) and master schedule flexibility for sufficient numbers of intervention courses (EPC)

Based on individual progress and minimum 20 hours of coursework per week. Students use My Path in iReady to improve math and reading skills.

Availability of standards-based instructional materials appropriate to all student groups (ESEA)

All students in our school have access to Flexpoint, an online board approved curriculum for k-12. Online curriculum is common core and a-g.

CUSD Alt. Ed. utilizes California State Standards materials, our intervention is based more on delivery strategies utilized: Differential instruction, strategic pacing, test retakes, and a focus on essential standards.

Student Population

For the past two years, many state and federal accountability requirements were waived or adjusted due to the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on LEAs, schools, and students. Beginning with the 2021-22 school year, the requirements to hold schools and districts accountable for student outcomes has returned with the release of the 2022 California School Dashboard (Dashboard). 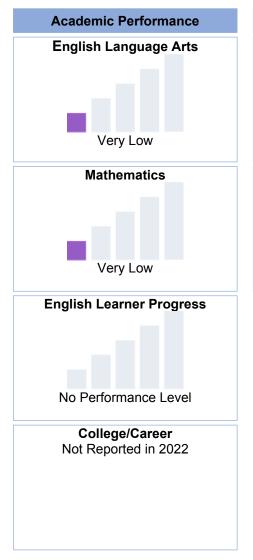

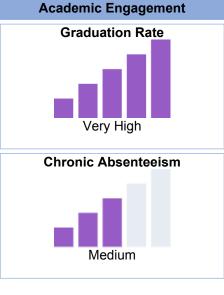

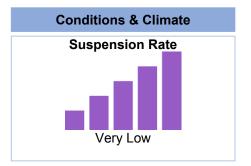

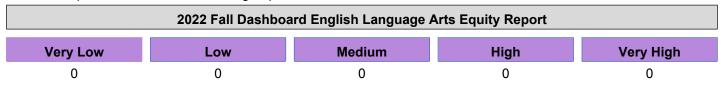

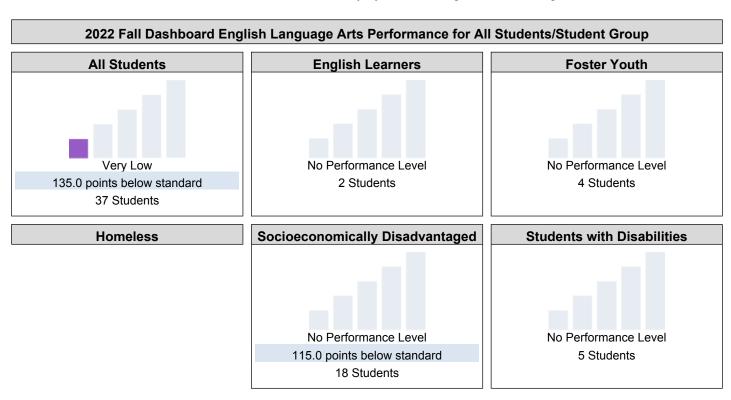

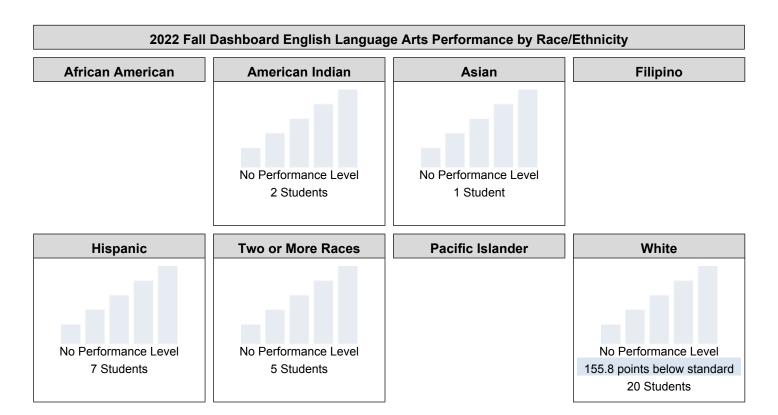

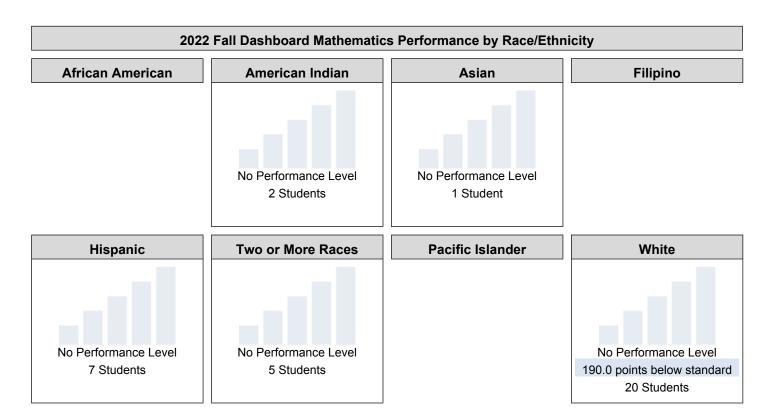

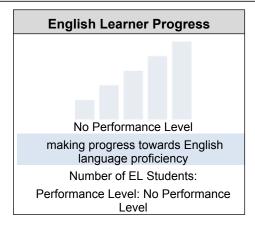

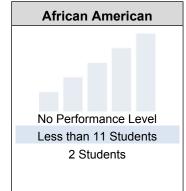


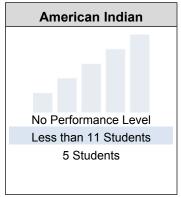


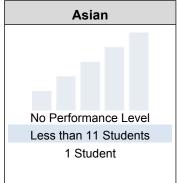


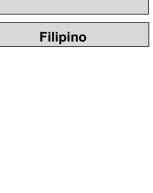


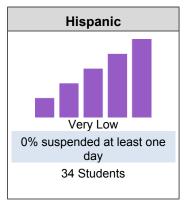
2022 Fall Dashboard Suspension Rate by Race/Ethnicity

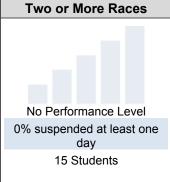


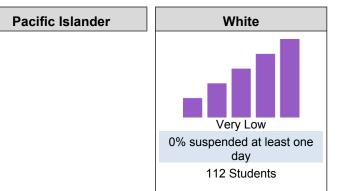

 - Help the school understand the subjects and skills for which teaching and learning need to be improved; and
 - ii. Identify the specific academic needs of students and groups of students who are not yet achieving the State's academic standards; and
 - iii. Assess the needs of the school relative to each of the components of the schoolwide program under §200.28.
 - iv. Develop the comprehensive needs assessment with the participation of individuals who will carry out the schoolwide program plan.
 - v. Document how it conducted the needs assessment, the results it obtained, and the conclusions it drew from those results.
 - B. Identification of the process for evaluating and monitoring the implementation of the SPSA and progress towards accomplishing the goals set forth in the SPSA (described in the Expected Annual Measurable Outcomes and Annual Review and Update).

Requirements for the Plan

- II. The SPSA shall include the following:
 - A. Goals set to improve pupil outcomes, including addressing the needs of student groups as identified through the needs assessment.

- B. Evidence-based strategies, actions, or services (described in Strategies and Activities)
 - 1. A description of the strategies that the school will be implementing to address school needs, including a description of how such strategies will-
 - a. provide opportunities for all children including each of the subgroups of students to meet the challenging state academic standards
 - b. use methods and instructional strategies that:
 - i. strengthen the academic program in the school,
 - ii. increase the amount and quality of learning time, and
 - iii. provide an enriched and accelerated curriculum, which may include programs, activities, and courses necessary to provide a well-rounded education.
 - c. Address the needs of all children in the school, but particularly the needs of those at risk of not meeting the challenging State academic standards, so that all students demonstrate at least proficiency on the State's academic standards through activities which may include:
 - i. strategies to improve students' skills outside the academic subject areas;
 - ii. preparation for and awareness of opportunities for postsecondary education and the workforce;
 - iii. implementation of a schoolwide tiered model to prevent and address problem behavior;
 - iv. professional development and other activities for teachers, paraprofessionals, and other school personnel to improve instruction and use of data; and
 - v. strategies for assisting preschool children in the transition from early childhood education programs to local elementary school programs.

- I. A description of any other activities and objectives as established by the SSC (described in the Strategies/Activities).
